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RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY BROWARD COUNTY, COMMISSIONERS OF FLORIDA. URGING THE BIDEN ADMINISTRATION TO EXTEND **PROTECTED** STATUS TEMPORARY 'TPS") DESIGNATION FOR HONDURAS AND TO DECI NEW INITIAL TPS DESIGNATION DATE FOR HONDURAS: AND **PROVIDING** FOR **SEVERABILITY** EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, on January 5, 1999, Honduran nationals were granted Temporary Protected Status ("TPS") as a result of the devastation caused to Honduras by Hurricane Mitch, which killed over 10,000 people, destroyed thousands of homes, and caused over \$5 billion in damage;

WHEREAS, Honduran nationals eligible for TPS protection must have been present in the United States as of January 5, 1999;

WHEREAS, the TPS designation for Honduras had been subsequently extended on numerous occasions until 2017 when the Department of Homeland Security ("DHS") announced its decision to terminate the TPS designation for Honduras effective January 5, 2020, following an 18-month transition period;

WHEREAS, due to a series of legal challenges, the TPS designation for Honduras was not terminated on January 5, 2020, and, most recently, on September 10, 2021, DHS announced that the TPS designation for Honduras was extended through December 31, 2022, because of the legal challenges;

WHEREAS, in the time since the initial announcement that the TPS designation for Honduras would be terminated, the situation in Honduras has deteriorated; the country has suffered devastating effects from the COVID-19 pandemic, and, in November 2020,

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two Category 4 Hurricanes, Eta and Iota, ravaged Honduras less than two weeks apart destroying roads, homes, hospitals, schools, and other critical infrastructure;

WHEREAS, the devastation caused by Hurricanes Eta and Iota—loss of 80% of the agricultural sector and over \$1.86 billion in damages in the midst of a pandemic—is on the scale to justify an independent designation of TPS for Honduras as the country struggles to recover;

WHEREAS, the approximately 57,000 Hondurans who currently have TPS have been in the United States since at least January of 1999, and have strong community ties, including U.S.-born children who should not have to choose between their parents and their birthright as Americans;

WHEREAS, according to the Central Bank of Honduras, 22% percent of the Gross Domestic Product ("GDP") of Honduras comes from remittances from TPS recipients and others, totaling more than \$5.7 billion annually;

WHEREAS, Honduras will be unable to safely receive or assimilate 57,000 or more Hondurans with TPS or to replace their remittances, which help sustain its economy, rendering deportations of Hondurans with TPS both unsafe and destabilizing; and

WHEREAS, Honduras currently meets all of the requirements for an initial designation of a foreign state under the TPS program—the environmental disasters of Hurricane Eta, Hurricane Iota, and the COVID-19 pandemic have caused a substantial disruption of the living conditions in Honduras, Honduras is currently unable to adequately handle the return of its nationals, and Honduran Minister of Foreign Affairs Lisandro Rosales officially requested designation of Honduras under the TPS statute on December 4, 2020, NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF 1 2 BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA: 3 4 The Board of County Commissioners of Broward County, Florida 5 ("Board"), urges President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., to instruct DHS to adopt a new TPS 6 designation date for Honduras and to extend TPS designation for Honduras beyond its 7 current December 31, 2022, expiration date. 8 9 Section 2. The Board urges Secretary of State Antony Blinken to recommend to President Joseph R. Biden, Jr., and DHS that conditions in Honduras fully warrant that 10 11 DHS adopt a new TPS designation date for Honduras and to extend TPS designation for 12 Honduras beyond its current December 31, 2022, expiration date. 13 14 Section 3. The Board urges DHS Secretary Alejandro Mayorkas to adopt a new 15 TPS designation date for Honduras and to extend TPS designation for Honduras beyond 16 its current December 31, 2022, expiration date. 17 18 Section 4. The Board authorizes transmission of this Resolution to President 19 Joseph R. Biden, Jr., White House Chief of Staff Ron A. Klain, Secretary of State Antony 20 Blinken, DHS Secretary Aleiandro Mayorkas. members of and the the 21 Broward Congressional Delegation. 22 23 24
