WHEREAS, on March 22, 2020, the County Administrator, pursuant to her emergency management powers under state law and local ordinance, directed the closure of all nonessential businesses in Broward County, subject to certain conditions and limitations:

WHEREAS, there is no vaccine or drug currently available to combat COVID-19;

WHEREAS, to reduce the spread of COVID-19, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention ("CDC") and the Florida State Department of Health recommend implementation of community mitigation strategies to increase containment of the virus, including cancellation of large gatherings and social distancing of at least six (6) feet between persons in smaller gatherings;

WHEREAS, limitations on gatherings and the use of social distancing to prevent transmission of COVID-19 are especially important for people who are over sixty (60) years old and people with chronic health conditions because those populations are at a higher risk of severe illness and death from COVID-19;

WHEREAS, Section 125.66(3), Florida Statutes, permits the Broward County Board of County Commissioners (the "Board") to waive the usual notice requirements for enactment of an ordinance upon four-fifths (4/5) vote of the membership of the Board that an emergency exists and that the immediate enactment of said ordinance is necessary;

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that the immediate enactment of this Emergency Ordinance is necessary to reinforce the County Administrator's powers during the current public health emergency;

WHEREAS, although the County shares jurisdiction with the state and municipalities over emergency management, the public health emergency created by

## Sec. 8-56. Supplemental emergency powers.

- (a) When necessary to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the County's residents and visitors, upon declaration of local state of emergency issued by either the County Administrator pursuant to Section 8-53 of the Broward County Code of Ordinances, or the Mayor pursuant to Section 2.04.G. of the Broward County Charter, the County Administrator is authorized to:
  - (1) Impose a general curfew applicable to Broward County, in whole or in part, during hours the County Administrator deems necessary, and modify said curfew from time to time as the County Administrator deems appropriate;
  - (2) Direct the evacuation of any area(s) of Broward County in which individuals are deemed to be in imminent danger;
  - (3) Prohibit or limit gatherings of individuals within Broward County;
  - (4) Order any or all commercial or business locations or places of public accommodation to close and remain closed until further order; and
  - (5) Order individuals to shelter in place.
  - (b) Violations.
  - (1) Violations of any order promulgated pursuant to this section shall be prosecuted in the same manner as misdemeanors are prosecuted pursuant to Section 125.69, Florida Statutes, punishable by imprisonment in the county jail not to exceed sixty (60) days, a Five Hundred Dollar (\$500.00) fine, or both.
  - (2) The County may issue citations for violations of this section through its designated code inspectors. Such citations shall be enforced as provided in Section 8½ of the Broward County Code of Ordinances. A fine of One

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Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) per day per violation shall be imposed for any act found to be in violation of this section, except that a violation found to be a knowing violation and to be irreparable or irreversible in nature shall be subject to a fine of up to Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) per violation.

- (3) Nothing herein shall limit the County's right to seek injunctive and other equitable relief to ensure compliance with any order made pursuant to this part.
- (c) The County Administrator shall determine the scope and duration of any measure taken pursuant to this section, but in no event shall the scope and duration of any such measure exceed the duration of the applicable emergency declaration. In exercising the powers under this section, the County Administrator should, to the fullest extent practicable under the circumstances, coordinate and consult with federal, state, and local governmental entities, and no power under this section shall be exercised if it would frustrate the emergency response of any federal or state entity.
- (d) Any order made pursuant to this section shall be enforceable, including by injunction or other equitable relief, by municipalities countywide. The criminal penalties established under this section may be enforced by the Broward County Sheriff or municipal law enforcement, as applicable.

## Section 3. <u>Severability</u>.

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If any portion of this Ordinance is determined by any court to be invalid, the invalid portion will be stricken, and such striking will not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance. If any court determines that this Ordinance, in whole or in part, cannot be legally applied to any individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance, such

determination will not affect the applicability of this Ordinance to any other individual, 2 group, entity, property, or circumstance. 3 Section 4. Inclusion in the Broward County Code of Ordinances. It is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners that the provisions of this 4 5 Ordinance become part of the Broward County Code of Ordinances as of the effective 6 date. The sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word 7 "ordinance" may be changed to "section," "article," or such other appropriate word or 8 phrase to the extent necessary in order to accomplish such intention. 9 Section 5.
