1	RESOLUTION NO. 2020-
2	A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY
3	COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, CONSENTING TO THE RESETTLEMENT OF REFUGEES
4	IN BROWARD COUNTY; URGING THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA TO CONSENT TO THE
5	RESETTLEMENT OF REFUGEES IN THE STATE OF FLORIDA; DIRECTING THAT THIS RESOLUTION BE
6	TRANSMITTED TO THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF STATE, THE GOVERNOR OF THE STATE OF
7	FLORIDA, AND THE BROWARD COUNTY LEGISLATIVE DELEGATION; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

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10	WHEREAS, Broward County ("County") has welcomed refugees facing religious,
11	ethnic, and political persecution for many years;
12	WHEREAS, the world is currently facing the worst refugee crisis in human history;
13	WHEREAS, by definition, refugees are individuals who have been forced to flee
14	their home country due to persecution based on their race, religion, nationality, political
15	opinion, or social group;
16	WHEREAS, resettlement is the last resort for refugees who cannot return to their
17	home country and cannot rebuild their lives where they first fled;
18	WHEREAS, the County is currently the home of resettled refugees who may be
19	joined by family members from whom they have been separated;
20	WHEREAS, community members, families, local organizations, and faith-based
21	institutions have supported the arrival and integration of refugee families;
22	WHEREAS, refugees have a significant net positive effect on the local economy;
23	WHEREAS, local employers hire refugee employees to help grow their business;
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WHEREAS, the United States government operates the U.S. Refugee Admissions
 Program ("Refugee Program") and mandates extensive refugee vetting for every refugee
 resettled to the United States;

WHEREAS, Executive Order 13888, On Enhancing State and Local Involvement *in Resettlement* ("Executive Order 13888"), requires that state and local governments
consent to the resettlement of refugees in their communities through the Resettlement
Program;

8 WHEREAS, the validity of Executive Order 13888 is presently being litigated and9 the issue of refugee resettlement is governed by federal law;

WHEREAS, the *FY 2020 Notice of Funding Opportunity for Reception and Placement Program* for nonprofits seeking to assist with the Refugee Program requires that for "each state and locality where the applicant proposes to resettle refugees during the award period, the applicant should seek written consent for resettlement of refugees from the state governor's office and the chief executive officer of the local government (county or county equivalent)"; and

16 WHEREAS, several nonprofit organizations have requested that the County17 consent to the resettlement of refugees, NOW, THEREFORE,

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BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OFBROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA:

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Section 1. As required by Executive Order 13888, the Board of County
Commissioners of Broward County, Florida ("Board"), hereby consents to the initial

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resettlement of refugees in the County by nonprofit organizations through the
 Resettlement Program.

Section 2. The Board states its consent trusting that the federal authority over
this subject matter will be exercised prudently and fairly, and with an equitable provision
of available federal resources to those communities consenting to welcome these
federally-vetted individuals who were displaced due to their race, religion, nationality,
political opinion, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Section 3. The Board directs the County Administrator to confirm in writing the
 Board's consent and to transmit a certified copy of this Resolution to the U.S. Department
 of State, Bureau of Population, Refugees, and Migration.

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Section 4. The Board urges the Governor of Florida to consent to initial refugee
resettlement as per the terms of Executive Order 13888.

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Section 5. The Board directs the County Administrator to transmit a certified
copy of this Resolution to the Governor and to all members of the Broward County
Legislative Delegation.

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Section 6. The consent provided in this Resolution is valid unless or untilwithdrawn.

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## Section 7. <u>Severability</u>.

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If any portion of this Resolution is determined by any court to be invalid, the invalid
portion will be stricken, and such striking will not affect the validity of the remainder of this
Resolution. If any court determines that this Resolution, in whole or in part, cannot be
legally applied to any individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance, such
determination will not affect the applicability of this Resolution to any other individual,
group, entity, property, or circumstance.

9	Section 8. <u>Effective Date</u> .
