RESOLUTION NO. 24-01

A RESOLUTION OF CLIMATE CHANGE TASK FORCE, AN ADVISORY BOARD TO
 THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA,
 SUPPORTING RENEWED COUNTY-WIDE ENGAGEMENT IN THE AUTHORIZATION
 OF PACE IN BROWARD COUNTY, UPDATES TO THE BROWARD COUNTY CODE
 OF ORDINANCES AND BROWARD COUNTY ADMINISTRATIVE CODE, AND
 COORDINATION WITH MUNICIPALITIES; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE
 DATE.

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9 WHEREAS, in 2010 the Florida Legislature enacted specific authority for local
10 governments to create programs for the financing of certain qualifying improvements to
11 real property by creating Section 163.08, Florida Statutes, commonly referred to as
12 Property Assessed Clean Energy (PACE);

WHEREAS, PACE provides a finance mechanism whereby property owners are
able to access secured financing for certain energy conservation, energy efficiency,
renewable energy, and wind resistance improvements to real property with repayment via
the owner's annual property tax bill;

WHEREAS, the Broward County Board of County Commissioners has adopted
increasingly aggressive energy efficiency, greenhouse gas reduction, renewable energy,
and resilience goals and initiatives, including a net zero goal by 2050, and requirements
to plan for future climate conditions;

21 WHEREAS, the Broward County Board of County Commissioners recognized 22 PACE as a strategy that could expand access to financing needed to support critical 23 property improvements by providing long-term cost saving, energy efficiency, renewable 24 energy, and property resilience improvements;

WHEREAS, the Broward County Board of County Commissioners directed staff to
 coordinate with interested local municipalities to deliver PACE financing services within
 Broward County;

WHEREAS, County staff was also directed to develop PACE program guidelines,
necessary agreements, and consumer protections as the framework and mechanism
providing for PACE finance entities (Program Administrators) to operate within Broward
County;

WHEREAS, since 2010, a total of four PACE Program Administrators have entered
 into interlocal agreements with Broward County providing for PACE financing to
 commercial and residential property owners for qualifying improvements;

35 WHEREAS, during the 2024 legislative session, Senate Bill 770 (SB 770) was 36 passed by the Florida legislature with provisions that: 1) affirm required authorization by 37 a county or municipal government in order for PACE Program Administrators to operate 38 within their jurisdictions, including by entering into interlocal agreements; 2) establish 39 formal and uniform minimum consumer protection provisions for PACE Program 40 Administrators and third-party administrators; and 3) expand the list of eligible PACE 41 qualifying improvements to include sanitary sewer connections, improvements to onsite 42 sewage treatment and disposal systems where sanitary sewer service is not available, 43 seawall improvements, and flood and water damage mitigation, such as structure

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44 elevation, flood diversion and drainage devices, and to meet sustainable and resilient
45 building standards;

WHEREAS, the approval of SB 770 would continue to support private property owners in advancing countywide climate goals and resilience through eligible energy and resilience improvements where there is a dearth of alternative sources of financing and programs available to support such improvements and resilience measures; goals, NOW, THEREFORE,

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BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CLIMATE CHANGE TASK FORCE:

52 Section 1. The Climate Change Task Force ("CCTF"), supports enactment of 53 amendments to: 1) consolidate Broward County's PACE provisions into the Broward 54 County Code of Ordinances; 2) require interlocal agreements with PACE Program 55 Administrators authorizing PACE financing of qualifying improvements to Broward County 56 property owners; and 3) updating Broward County's consumer protections and PACE 57 financing limitations for consistency with Senate Bill 770 and to provide for better 58 consumer protections, financing limitations, and contractor practices.

Section 2. The CCTF supports continued and renewed coordination with local
municipalities to include municipal jurisdictions within Broward County's PACE Program
Administrator interlocal agreements, thereby streamlining renewed authorizations, liaison
services, communications, and support services.

63 Section 3. The CCTF hereby directs CCTF staff to transmit copies of this
64 Resolution to the Broward County Board of County Commissioners, the County
65 Administrator, and the County Attorney.
