# B. Has this site been previously surveyed, reviewed or recorded as a historical resource? (reference prior recordings or surveys if known)

Yes, the Old Hallandale Schoolhouse was first recorded in 1992 under Florida Master Site File No. 8BD192.

The Old (or Historic) Hallandale Schoolhouse was initiated for municipal historic designation by the City of Hallandale's Historic Preservation Board in 2008.

The site has also been noted in two books about the city:

Hallandale by Bill McGoun (Published 1976); and,

<u>Hallandale Beach Florida; For More than Ninety Years Broward County's City of Choice</u> by Seth H. Bramson (Published 2010).

C. Has this site been recorded in the Florida Master Site File? (reference the FMSF recording number if affirmative)

Yes. The Old Hallandale Schoolhouse was recorded under FSMF Number 8BD192.

# D. Is this site listed (or eligible for listing) in the National Register of Historical Places? (reference the date of the certification of the nomination if known)

Although the Old (Historic) Hallandale Schoolhouse was relocated in 1966 (59 years from the date of this Application), in the opinion of the County's Historic Preservation Officer, the structure is eligible for National Register nomination based on its status as the oldest extant school building in Hallandale Beach and Broward County and on its association with early efforts of exerting local control from Dade County.

## E. Is this site potentially eligible for local designation? (if so, please reference the criteria for designation that apply under Broward County Ordinance 2014-32)

The Historic Hallandale Schoolhouse is eligible for Broward County historic resource designation based on meeting the following criteria of Broward's Historic Preservation Ordinance No. 2014-32:

(2) A site, building, structure, object, landscape feature, or district that is not listed in the National Register of Historic Places may be designated only if it conveys an overall sense of past time and place by possessing at least three (3) of the following attributes of integrity: location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, and association,

<u>Design</u> – The Historic Hallandale Schoolhouse embodies many of the architectural characteristics of small schoolhouse buildings constructed in the United States during the latter half of the 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. The structure was built in 1910, in what is today commonly referred to as the 'Frame Vernacular' style. The schoolhouse is a wood frame building with high pitch hip roof, front porch, large single hung sash windows, transom doors and flexible interior space that can be divided into two separate rooms or unified as one large space. The raised foundation, high pitch roof line, high windows and transoms are building elements appropriate for the sub tropics, allowing proper ventilation in an era that predates mechanical cooling.

Materials – The schoolhouse is of wood frame construction of various construction techniques that provide evidence of fine

Continuation of criteria for designation (E.):

carpentry assemblage. Original wood timbers and framing remain, exterior and interior wood cladding is largely new. Interior walls are generally beaded board panels.

<u>Workmanship</u> – The Historic Hallandale Schoolhouse, built originally by volunteers from the local community, demonstrates the fine quality workmanship and craftsmanship that original Hallandale settlers had, many of whom were immigrant Swedes. The restoration of the Schoolhouse by carpenters from the City of Hallandale's Department of Public Works continued a level of craftsmanship rarely found in South Florida today.

<u>Association</u> – The Historic Hallandale Schoolhouse is associated with early 20<sup>th</sup> century education (more specifically with small town education) when one or two-room schoolhouses were still in use. The fact that the schoolhouse was built by local volunteers and not by school board contractors is a testament to the motivation, skills and craftsmanship of the local population.

#### Briefly describe the existing area context of the site

Before its modern development began, at the turn of the 19<sup>th</sup>/20<sup>th</sup> century, southeastern Florida consisted of a wilderness dominated by slash pine trees, palmetto scrub, sawgrass, live oaks, mangroves and various subtropical and tropical plants and understory. The vegetation that once covered what is now the mainland part of Hallandale Beach was, in the early years of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, removed when the land was prepared for agricultural use. A ridge of oolitic limestone runs along the coastline of southeastern Florida, forming the only 'high' ground found in the area that reaches roughly from the Atlantic coastline to the nearby Everglades. This rock substrate found approximately two feet below surface underlays the soil of much of the lower eastern coast. Only a few miles inland, the coastal ridge gives way to the Everglades, a slow-moving freshwater swamp approximately thirty miles wide and one hundred miles long that stretches across the lower part of the peninsula. Reclamation or drainage of the swamp in the early 20<sup>th</sup> century extended farm, grazing and habitable land beyond the coast and coastal ridge at an environmental cost that only in recent years has begun to be fully acknowledged.

#### IV. SITE HISTORY (if additional space needed use SUPPLEMENTAL INFORMATION page)

Briefly describe the history of the site, including prior owner(s)

The historic Hallandale Schoolhouse, constructed in 1910, was utilized as a school by the community of Hallandale until the Spring of 1916. It is the oldest known building in Broward County to have been originally constructed as a schoolhouse.

The first school of Hallandale was a single room facility, constructed in 1904 at the Northwest corner of what is today West Hallandale Beach Boulevard (Originally West Beach Boulevard) and Second Avenue. Inside its walls, first grade through eighth grade was taught to approximately twelve children.

In 1910, the original schoolhouse was razed by a hurricane. The town had a population large enough to warrant construction of a two-room schoolhouse on the same site. However, Dade County (Broward County would not be incorporated until five years later.) claimed that it did not have any money to construct a new school building. However, the School Board did supply the lumber and necessary building materials to construct another schoolhouse. Hallandale residents then ventured South to Miami, acquired the building materials, and delivered these materials to the site where the school was to be built.

At this site, residents voluntarily constructed a larger, two room schoolhouse themselves. There are no known sketches or plans to have been employed in the design or construction of the schoolhouse.

According to Helen Larson (Born in 1907), a long-time local Hallandale resident residing in the city until 1959, the school consisted of two large rooms. Additionally, the school had a sliding door partition that allowed for use either as a large room or two classrooms.

Final classes in the schoolhouse were conducted in the Spring of 1916. After 1916, the children of the community started attending school in a newly constructed two-level school building that existed until 1941. During the next five years, some evidence exists that the building was occasionally utilized as a residence or as a meeting hall.

In 1921, the Bethlehem Lutheran Church, located next door to the schoolhouse, held an exclusive meeting to discuss the purchase of the former schoolhouse building. John Olsen, a resident of the community, offered to financially contribute the necessary \$1,000 to purchase the building and two lots of land from the local school board. The Ladies Aid Organization of the church provided a down payment of \$200 and the church congregation agreed to annually pay \$100 in addition to interest for the balance.

The building was utilized by the church for multiple purposes for the next four-and-a-half decades, including as a church learning center, for holding church lay meetings, as a parish house and for Sunday School classes. In 1935, the schoolhouse was utilized as the temporary main chapel for Sunday church services when the main sanctuary of the church suffered hurricane damage that year.

By 1966, the religious establishment needed the land for other purposes, so it donated the structure to the police department of the city. By 1969, the schoolhouse was relocated to a new location within a facility under the public works department of the City of Hallandale Beach. It was adapted for utilization by the Police Benevolent Association (PBA) and was utilized by the association as a recreational hall and a meeting hall.

In the mid-to-late 2000s, the schoolhouse was moved once again approximately 450 feet south to its present location. This was due to the nature of the daily operations that take place in the compound of

the department. These include, but are not limited to, storage of landscape and construction materials, heavy traffic of sanitation trucks, and construction. Additionally, the schoolhouse was neighbored by a one-million-gallon storage ground tank containing water. Furthermore, the tank overflow valve was parallel to the schoolhouse. This continuously moistened the surrounding ground which, in turn, contributed to decay of the structure.

As a result of this, the city of Hallandale Beach received a grant from a grant program created by the Broward County Historical Commission and the Board of County Commissioners. The grant would specifically provide funding to relocate the schoolhouse in addition to stabilizing it on a new foundation. Additionally, this grant would permit much easier public access to the structure. In 2009, the schoolhouse was relocated to its present location at 648 NW 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. A perimeter wall was constructed to separate it from the Public Works compound. When this project was completed in September 2009, both goals of the grant – locating the schoolhouse away from the Public Works compound and permitting easier public access - had been achieved.

Approximately one year later, the City of Hallandale Beach received city and county grants to restore both the interior and exterior of the schoolhouse. The project rehabilitated the schoolhouse into a history museum/exhibition hall. One of the classrooms was restored to its original classroom appearance. The other classroom was planned to house general historical exhibits. Work started in September of 2010 and craftsman from the Department of Public Works of the City of Hallandale Beach worked diligently to ultimately revitalize the structure. The restoration was fully completed fourteen months later. The official grand opening ceremony of the Historic Hallandale Schoolhouse occurred on February 18, 2015.

Presently, the east room and the patio of the schoolhouse are available for social functions and meetings. The west room of the structure is set up to reassemble a school classroom circa 1910 with items and artifacts representative of the era.

#### Briefly describe the architecture, construction, design, or physical elements of the site

This one-story Frame Vernacular educational building is located at 648 Northwest 2<sup>nd</sup> Street, 3 blocks to the north of Hallandale Beach Boulevard and approximately 7 blocks west of the Dixie Highway and Florida East Coast Railway corridor. Notable architectural features include a square floor plan under a high-pitched hip roof, symmetrical façade (or front elevation), and a porch or verandah on the south end. The porch is integrated under the main asphalt shingle hip roof supported by tapering wood posts and over a poured concrete floor. The exterior wall fabric is beaded board above the porch and below eaves and ceilings, Ship Lapped (or Novelty Drop) wood siding. Doors include vertical panels and transoms above and windows are 2/2 single hung sash windows. The schoolhouse was beautifully restored and reinaugurated in 2015 with the aid of local, county and state funding. The entire building is painted white (interiors are stained wood) and framed with tropical plants projecting an overall pleasing appearance


