RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, REAFFIRMING SUPPORT OF COMMUNITY WATER FLUORIDATION TO PROMOTE PUBLIC HEALTH AND PREVENT TOOTH DECAY; RECOGNIZING THE CRITICAL ROLE OF WATER FLUORIDATION AND PROVIDING FOR CONTINUED ADVOCACY OF FLUORIDATION IN PUBLIC WATER SYSTEMS; PROVIDING FOR TRANSMITTAL OF THIS RESOLUTION; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, over seventy years of scientific research and practical experience consistently demonstrate that community water fluoridation is safe and effective;

WHEREAS, in 1945 Grand Rapids, Michigan, became the first community water system to add fluoride to its water, resulting in a sixty percent reduction in dental cavities among children over a ten-year period;

WHEREAS, in 1974 the federal government enacted the Safe Drinking Water Act, providing the framework for ensuring safe levels of naturally occurring fluoride and any added fluoride in public drinking water systems;

WHEREAS, in compliance with state and federal drinking water standards, Broward County Water and Wastewater Services began adding fluoride to potable water;

WHEREAS, in 2015 the U.S. Public Health Service updated the fluoride drinking water standard to an optimal concentration of 0.7 milligrams per liter (mg/L) to provide the best balance of protection from tooth decay while minimizing the risk of dental fluorosis;

 WHEREAS, seventy-seven percent of all Americans presently served by public water systems have access to fluoridated water;

WHEREAS, the American Dental Association (ADA) acknowledges the fluoridation of community water supplies as the single most effective public health measure to prevent tooth decay, with studies showing that water fluoridation reduces tooth decay by more than twenty-five percent, despite widespread fluoride availability from other sources like toothpaste;

WHEREAS, reputable scientific studies show that fluoride concentrations below 1.5 mg/L have no adverse impacts on human health and do not lead to cognitive impairment;

WHEREAS, the ADA determined that water fluoridation is the most cost-efficient method of preventing tooth decay, with the lifetime cost of water fluoridation for one person being less than the cost of one dental filling, and strongly supports community water fluoridation as a safe, effective, cost-saving, and equitable way to prevent tooth decay;

WHEREAS the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recognizes community water fluoridation as one of the ten greatest public health achievements of the 20th century, benefiting everyone, particularly those without access to regular dental care, thereby making it a vital tool in advancing social justice and health equity;

WHEREAS, U.S. courts consistently uphold water fluoridation as a lawful and proper means of advancing public health and welfare;

44 WHEREAS, all twenty-seven Broward County public water suppliers add fluoride 45 to their water systems, maintaining fluoride levels at or below the federally recommended 0.7 mg/L; and 46 47 WHEREAS, the County's public water supply will remain compliant with the 48 federal guidelines and the County urges other Broward County public water suppliers to 49 continue fluoridating their water systems consistent with those guidelines, NOW, 50 THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF 51 52 BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA: 53 Section 1. The Board of County Commissioners of Broward County, Florida 54 ("Board"), reaffirms its support for the fluoridation of community water supplies as a 55 proven public health measure to prevent tooth decay and promote oral health for all 56 residents. 57 Section 2. The Board recognizes the critical role water fluoridation plays in 58 ensuring access to efficient, preventive oral health care which helps protects the health 59 and welfare of Broward County residents. 60 Section 3. The Board hereby directs the County Administrator to transmit 61 certified copies of this Resolution to all Broward County municipalities and water 62 providers. 63 Section 4. Severability. 64 If any portion of this Resolution is determined by any court to be invalid, the invalid

portion will be stricken, and such striking will not affect the validity of the remainder of this

Resolution. If any court determines that this Resolution, in whole or in part, cannot be

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legally applied to any individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance, such determination will not affect the applicability of this Resolution to any other individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance.

Section 5. Effective Date.

This Resolution is effective upon adoption.
