### Requested Action

<u>MOTION TO ADOPT</u> Resolution No. 2020-677 directing the County Administrator to publish Notice of Public Hearing to be held on Tuesday, December 1, 2020, at 10:00 a.m., in Room 422 of the Governmental Center to consider enactment of a proposed Ordinance, the title of which is as follows:

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, PERTAINING TO THE HUMAN RIGHTS ACT; AMENDING VARIOUS SECTIONS OF CHAPTER 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> OF THE BROWARD COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES ("CODE"); PROVIDING FOR THE REMOVAL OF CERTAIN RELIGIOUS EXEMPTIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, INCLUSION IN THE CODE, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE. (Sponsored by Commissioner Tim Ryan)

#### Why Action is Necessary

The proposed Ordinance was prepared by the Office of the County Attorney at the direction of the Board of County Commissioners at its meeting of August 25, 2020.

#### What Action Accomplishes

Enables the setting of a public hearing during which the Board may consider enacting an Ordinance amending Chapter 16½ of the Code to remove certain religious exemptions.

#### Previous Action Taken

#### Summary Explanation/Background

On August 25, 2020, the Board directed the Office of the County Attorney to draft amendments to Chapter 16<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> of the Broward County Code of Ordinances ("Human Rights Act") removing certain religious exemptions currently in the Human Rights Act.

The Human Rights Act provides that religious entities are exempt from certain prohibitions of the Human Rights Act, such as discriminating against certain protected classifications relating to employment, public accommodations, and real estate transactions Recently, the United States Supreme Court recognized that sexual orientation and gender identity are protected under Title VII of

the Civil Rights Act of 1964. The United States Supreme Court also issued a decision clarifying the ministerial exception under the First Amendment that limits employment discrimination claims against religious school employees who are educating students about their faith.

The proposed amendment would narrow the current exemptions for religious entities to be consistent with the requirements and religious exemptions of Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964.
