MOTION TO APPROVE Easement granting Florida Power & Light Company a perpetual, non-exclusive underground utility easement on a portion of County-owned property located at 920 NW 7th Avenue in Fort Lauderdale for the relocation of overhead electrical lines to power an affordable housing project; authorize the Mayor and Clerk to execute the easement; and authorize recordation of same. **(Commission District 7)**

Board of County Commissioners' approval is required to grant an interest in real property pursuant to Broward County Administrative Code, Section 6.23.

What Action Accomplishes

Provides Florida Power & Light Company with a perpetual, non-exclusive underground utility easement to relocate overhead electrical lines to power an affordable housing project.

Summary Explanation/Background

Housing Finance and Community Redevelopment and Human Services Department requested that the County grant Florida Power & Light Company a perpetual, non-exclusive underground utility easement to allow the relocation of electrical power currently provided by overhead lines to the Central Homeless Assistance Center (CHAC). The relocation is required to facilitate the construction of an approved affordable housing project, Seven on Seventh, adjacent to the Central Homeless Assistance Center. It is normal and customary for overhead utility lines to be relocated to accommodate major renovations.
