## **PROPOSED**

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AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA, PERTAINING TO CORONARY CALCIUM SCAN DISCLOSURES; CREATING SECTION 15-1 OF THE BROWARD COUNTY CODE OF ORDINANCES ("CODE") TO REQUIRE CERTAIN DISCLOSURES; AND PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY, INCLUSION IN THE CODE, AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, cardiovascular disease is a leading cause of death in Broward County and throughout Florida, making accurate diagnostic information critical to public health;

WHEREAS, coronary computed tomography ("CT") scans without contrast, commonly referred to as calcium score tests, are increasingly used as screening tools for cardiovascular disease;

WHEREAS, while calcium score tests can effectively detect calcified plaque in coronary arteries, they cannot detect or visualize noncalcified (soft) plaque, which may also contribute to cardiovascular events; and

WHEREAS, the public has a compelling interest in receiving accurate information about the capabilities and limitations of calcium score tests to enable them to make better informed healthcare decisions,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF BROWARD COUNTY, FLORIDA:

Section 1. Section 15-1 of the Broward County Code of Ordinances is hereby created to read as follows:

## Sec. 15-1. Calcium score test disclosure.

(a) Required disclosure. Any person or entity, including but not limited to any hospital, diagnostic center, or healthcare or medical provider, that administers or performs a coronary computed tomography scan without contrast (calcium score test) within Broward County shall provide a written disclosure to the patient, either as a separate document or as a separate section in an existing consent form, prior to performing the test. The disclosure, which must be signed by the patient, must state the following:

DISCLOSURE: A calcium score test (coronary computed tomography scan without contrast) does not detect or visualize soft plaque. A calcium score test only detects hard plaque and does not detect soft plaque. A buildup of soft plaque can cause a heart attack. A different test, called a cardiac computed tomography angiography (CCTA) scan, can detect both hard and soft plaque.

(b) Required retention. The healthcare or medical provider must retain the required patient-signed disclosure for a period of at least two (2) years, and must provide to the County, upon request—which may be periodically made—a sworn declaration stating that it has obtained all patient-signed disclosures required by this section during the time period addressed in the County's request.

## Section 2. Severability.

If any portion of this Ordinance is determined by any court to be invalid, the invalid portion will be stricken, and such striking will not affect the validity of the remainder of this Ordinance. If any court determines that this Ordinance, in whole or in part, cannot be legally applied to any individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance, such determination will not affect the applicability of this Ordinance to any other individual, group, entity, property, or circumstance.

Section 3. Inclusion in the Broward County Code of Ordinances.

It is the intention of the Board of County Commissioners that the provisions of this Ordinance become part of the Broward County Code of Ordinances as of the effective date. The sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered and the word "ordinance" may be changed to "section," "article," or such other appropriate word or phrase to the extent necessary to accomplish such intention.

Section 4. Effective Date.

This Ordinance is effective as of November 1, 2025.
