RE: Broward County Vehicle-For-Hire Vehicle Standards and Taximeter Rates

Pursuant to Board discussion of Agenda Item #48 on April 22, 2025, staff met with representatives from the Hospitality Industry and the Taxi Industry regarding taxi vehicle age, standards and taximeter rate updates. In addition, Hospitality Industry representatives provided other recommendations which are included in Attachment 1 and summarized below. Hospitality Industry representatives included hotel and restaurant owners, Greater Ft. Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce, and TravelHost FTL, among others. Taxi industry representatives included large fleet operators (Yellow Cab, United Cab, Intercity Taxi) and independent taxi owners and taxi drivers (the Broward Taxi Association). Staff also met with Port Everglades and Ft. Lauderdale Airport staff.

There was not a consensus among these groups on creating vehicle age limitations, changes to vehicle standards or the need for increases in taxicab rates.

Hospitality Industry recommendations (as detailed in Attachment 1) include:

Vehicle Age - vehicles to be no older than 5 years old

Vehicle Standards - require a uniform color scheme and logo; no visible damage or unclean interiors; a digital display of driver ID and taxi license

Taxicab Rates - did not express a position on a taxicab rate increase, though they were open to higher, flat fares between Ft. Lauderdale Airport and Port Everglades

In addition to the above, the hospitality industry had many other recommendations including taxi driver recruitment, training and performance monitoring, taxi technologies such as a rider app, taxi dispatch and fare transparency as well as taxi quality assurance via inspections and licensing.

Taxicab Industry Large Fleet Operator recommendations include:

Vehicle Age - vehicles to be no older than 15 years old with a gradual phase-in to a 10-year age limit, as well as newly permitted vehicles being under 10 years old

Vehicle Standards – posted rates on vehicles, working/operating air conditioning, cleanliness **Taxicab Rates** – opposed to any rate increases. Expressed concern that a rate increase might price taxicabs out of the market.

Taxicab Industry Independent Taxicab Owner and Taxicab Drivers (Broward Taxi Association) recommendations (as detailed in Attachment 2) include:

Vehicle Age – no position taken

Vehicle Standards – no position taken

Taxicab Rates – their focus is on the need for a rate increase (as detailed in Attachment 5)

The Consumer Protection Division (CPD) has also completed its bi-annual review of taximeter rates pursuant to Section 221/2-11(c)(1) of the Broward County Code (as detailed in Attachment 5). Based on its review, the Division does not recommend an increase at this time. The rationale for this recommendation includes: (1) The Board of County Commissioners adopted a Resolution providing for a 20% increase in December 2023; and (2) our current ranking of seventh out of the 19 compared jurisdictions puts us in the top third pricewise, above locations such as San Francisco and Boston; and (3) observed parity between current taxi rates and rideshare rates, with taxis at times the more expensive option and rideshare the more expensive option at other times; and (4) the large taxi operators expressed concerns that an increase in taxicab rates might price taxicabs out of the market.

Attachment 1 - Tourism Industry Vehicle Standards Recommendations

Submitted by representatives (via email) of the Tourism Industry in Broward County (Travel Host FTL, The Restaurant People, Greater Ft. Lauderdale Chamber of Commerce, Riverside Hotel, Orchestra Hotels + Resorts, Economos Properties, Water Taxi, Park & K Public Affairs, Visit Lauderdale) "to provide a strategic plan for first in class taxi experience in Broward County, addressing both **service excellence** and **vehicle quality**."

Creation of Vision & Standards

Broward County Taxi Service Goal:

We need to establish the Broward County's taxi service as the safest, most reliable, highest quality and customer-friendly transport choice. Benchmark to communities that have the highest taxi service rating in the USA and acquire their best practices and / or programs. (Miami, Las Vegas, New York, San Francisco, Chicago, Boston, Washington)

Broward County Taxi Core Standards:

- Clean, well-maintained vehicles
- Punctual and polite drivers
- Transparent and fair pricing
- Safety and accessibility for all passengers

Develop Vehicle Quality Improvement Plan, so current operators in Broward County have a chance to achieve standards

A. Broward County Fleet Modernization:

- Require vehicles to be no older than 5 years.
- Introduce electric or hybrid taxis (offer incentives for eco-friendly upgrades).
- Ensure all cabs have:
 - Air conditioning/heating
 - GPS tracking
 - Regular mechanical inspections (every 6 months)
 - Use all methods of payment
 - Have an APP

B. Broward County Taxi Visual Standards:

- Uniform branding for all taxis (color scheme, logo), so easy to identify
- No visible damage or unclean interiors
- Digital display of driver ID and taxi license

 - Language proficiency (if multilingual populations exist); must speak English
- B. Taxi Driver Training:
 - Mandatory customer service and defensive driving training; certification
 - Annual refresher courses
 - Accessibility training (for assisting elderly or disabled passengers)
- C. Taxi Driver Performance Monitoring:
 - Driver rating system (customer feedback + internal audits)
 - Incentives for top-rated drivers (bonuses, recognition)
 - Penalties for poor conduct or repeated complaints
 - Online reviews scorecard

Broward County Taxi Technology Integration to better compete with Shared Ride:

- A. Taxi Rider App:
 - Book, track, and rate rides
 - Fare estimation & digital payments
 - SOS/panic button and live support
- B. Taxi Dispatch System:
 - Al-powered matching to reduce wait times
 - Central fleet tracking and analytics dashboard

Enforce Broward County Taxi Fare Pricing & Transparency

- Fare regulation via county authority or independent board
- Up-front fare estimates in-app and in-vehicle
- Printed or digital receipts after each trip

Dear Commissioners and elected officials, Transportation Department and Consumer Affairs,

I am writing you to formally request a review and a scheduled hearing regarding the current taxi cab rates at Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood International Airport (FLL), Port Everglades, and the surrounding areas. As an essential part of the transportation industry serving both residents and visitors, it is critical to ensure that taxi fares are fair, viable, and mutually acceptable for both drivers and passengers.

As a reminder, the cab services were originally created to serve urban populations, particularly catering to middle and working class individuals who can financially afford the services.

After a thorough review, we have found that the current rates do not adequately cover the operating costs, particularly for short-distance (<5 miles radius) trips. Factors such as airport fees, credit card processing fees, technology fees, repair and vehicle maintenance, commercial insurance and long wait times, 2 to 5 hours, significantly impact the ability of drivers to earn a sustainable income. Comparisons with Miami and West Palm Beach taxi fares structure also highlight disparities that place Broward taxi drivers at a financial disadvantage.

We respectfully request a formal review and hearing to discuss these concerns and explore necessary adjustments to the rate structure. Our goal is to make sure that the fares reflect true costs of operating a taxi service while maintaining accessibility for passengers.

Proposal for adjusted Taxi Fares Structure in Fort Lauderdale and Hollywood

1 - EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

This proposal seeks approval for adjustments to the current taxi fares structure at Fort Lauderdale-Hollywood and Port Everglades. The current fares do not adequately cover operating costs, leading to financial burden on the drivers. This revision aligns with industry standards, cost-of-service principles, and market competitiveness while ensuring fair compensation for taxi operators.

2 - Justification for fare adjustments.

A- Fixed Costs (Yearly) Vehicle lease or car loan, commercial insurance, licensing and regulatory fees amount to approximately\$ 18 361.00 per year or \$14.69 per ride

- B Variable Cost per ride: fuel, repair and maintenance, credit card, technology, tablet fees contribute to an estimated \$2.05 per ride.
- C Driver compensation: to maintain a fair wage standard, drivers should earn at least \$15.00 per hour as per Florida Statue 448.110 Minimum wage.
- D Regulatory and airport fees: the mandatory airport fee of \$3.00 per ride further impact net earnings.

3 - Considerations and Facts of the Taxi industry.

Base fare Calculation (GAAP driven approach).

The minimum fare must cover: a) Fixed costs, b) variable costs, and a reasonable profit margin, and, we will assume:

- . Average ride distance is: 5 miles
- . Average ride time is: 15 minutes.
- . Average yearly ride per driver is: 1 250.
- . Profit Margin is: 15%.
- . Average yearly mileage driven per driver is: 55 000 miles.
- . Airport fee is: \$3.00 per ride.
- . Short rides represent 50-60% of the taxi business.
- . Average waiting time before a fare is between 2 to 5 hours at the Port or Airport.

5 Market-Based Comparisons.

MINIMUN charge per ride is:

. Miami charges \$0.55 per additional 1/6 mile compared to Fort Lauderdale at \$0.48 per 1/6 per mile.

- . Miami enforces higher rates (+30%) for SUVs and larger vehicles, whereas Fort Lauderdale does not.
- . In West Palm Beach, more than passengers, there is additional charge of \$3.00 per passenger and an origination fee of \$3.50 for Origination fee, whereas Fort Lauderdale does not.
- . Ride-Sharing companies like Uber and Lift utilizes surge and dynamic pricing, increasing when they see fit, whereas Fort Lauderdale does not.

7 - Impact of Short distance Trips.

Short fares incur losses due to credit card, airport fees and wait times.



- 1) Drivers will no longer collect funds for BCAD, will instead pay fee in advance before each ride.
- 2) Because of past losses, drivers will collect fares up front at the origination location.
- 3) Drivers request a system that captures the toll fee and include it in the fare.
- 4) Excessive, arbitrary and abusive actions of the Broward County agents against cab drivers must stop (reaping off hack licenses from cab drivers).
- 5) Drivers request that credit card fees to be paid on the meter by the customers.

Palm Beach County vehicle inspection standards are identical to Broward County. There are currently no vehicle age restrictions for Broward nor Palm Beach Counties. Miami-Dade County limits vehicles to under 15 years of age. Uber and Lyft restrict vehicles to 2009 (16 years) or newer.

Attachment 5 - Taximeter Rate Review

As requested by the Board of County Commissioners ("Board") during the April 22, 2025 meeting, and in response to a proposal for taxi fare adjustments submitted by representatives of the Broward Taxi Association, in August 2025 the Consumer Protection Division (CPD) completed its bi-annual review of taximeter rates, pursuant to Section 22½-11(c)(1) of the Broward County Code.

Current rates for a five (5) mile trip in Broward County yield a \$17.42 fare; a comparable trip in Miami- Dade County yields a \$20.40 fare; a five (5) mile trip from Palm Beach International Airport yields \$15.37 (note: Palm Beach County does not regulate taxi fees outside of the airport). Based on review of 18 other comparable jurisdictions, including Miami-Dade County and Palm Beach International Airport, Broward County ranks seventh (see 2025 Taxi Rate Survey). Five (5) of the 19 jurisdictions, including Broward County, have raised their taximeter rates since CPD's last review in 2023

The Board adopted a Resolution providing for a 20% increase in December 2023, increasing the drop (initial) rate from \$2.95 to \$3.50, and increasing the one-sixth (1/6) of a mile from \$0.40 to \$0.48. Since the rate increase in 2023, the Consumer Price Index ("CPI") in South Florida has increased 5.08%, while gas prices have decreased by 2.6%. Transportation network companies ("TNC") rates for off-peak hours are comparable to Broward County's current taximeter rates; however, surge pricing can increase TNC rates to more than 48% higher than taxi rates.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on its review, the Division **does not recommend an increase at this time**. The rationale for this recommendation includes: (1) The Board of County Commissioners adopted a Resolution providing for a 20% increase in December 2023; and (2) our current ranking of seventh out of the 19 compared jurisdictions puts us in the top third pricewise, above locations such as San Francisco and Boston; and (3) observed parity between current taxi rates and rideshare rates, with taxis at times the more expensive option and rideshare the more expensive option at other times; and (4) the large taxi operators expressed concerns that an increase in taxicab rates might price taxicabs out of the market.
